Stallion Inspection Update

It's a year ago now since Australian Shire owners were thrown into regarding the stallion uproar inspection issue. The Shire Horse Society was planning Australian Shire judges, plus the vet, to inspect colts in Australia for full registration, instead of the existing system of only using the vet. Costs of the expenses of the judges, travelling to perform the inspections. were to born be exclusively by the colt owner.

The SHSA had some serious concerns about this proposal. One was that the new scheme would impose unfair costs on Australian Shire colt owners, especially with distances in our country. the Secondly, as there are only two English qualified judges in Australia, both breeders themselves, we had some serious concerns about possible conflict of interest and impartiality issues. Therefore we asked the Society in England to allow our representative to make a presentation to them on the issue, to which they agreed.

Ineke Kuiper made the presentation to the Shire Horse Society as our delegate, outlining our concerns. We suggested that the vet system had worked very well to date, and that they could request photos or a video, to be sent to England, if they were concerned about type.

We later submitted a sample video showing both the features of the

horse and a work out for further consideration by the Shire Horse Society. This was very well received by the Society who sent us a letter thanking us for our efforts.

We are waiting for official confirmation from England of their final decision on this matter, however the following article was printed in the latest issue of the Heavy Horse World....

☐ The Shire Horse Society is hoping to change and improve the way it carries out stallion inspections abroad. Currently the society's inspection team, accompanied by local vets, visits colts abroad to decide on studbook registrations: in some cases judges undertaking duties at summer shows double as stallion inspectors. To reduce cost and standardise the inspections worldwide the society is now considering delegating this duty to local equine vets who would receive instruction in the society's breeding criteria and complete a detailed form for consideration by the society's appropriate committees. High quality digital images, including video, would be taken of the animal concerned to assist the process. Society secretary Andrew Mercer said the society hoped this would make the process more streamlined and affordable.

FOALING

LENGTH OF THE PREGNANCY

The duration of pregnancy is very variable and can range between 305-400 days, although the usual length is between 335-342 days. One of the most common concerns for clients is mares going over their due date. Remember they can go up to 400 days and still be ok.

SIGNS OF IMPEDING BIRTH

The signs can be very variable, but the most consistent sign is the filling up of the udder and teats with milk/colostrum, commonly known as "bagging up". This can start a couple of weeks before birth. 24-48 hours prior to the foaling, dry, waxy colostrum appears on the teats ("Waxing up"). Other signs include lengthening of the vulva and loosing of muscles towards the back of the rump.

Labour is divided into three stages.

urinate frequently, and may seem restless getting up and down constantly.

Eventually the allantochorion ruptures (water breaks) and this marks the start of stage two of labour.

Stage 2

This stage involves active forceful straining and the foal is usually born in 20 minutes. The mare may lie down and strain for a few minutes and then get up and change position or rest. If there is active forceful straining for more than 20-30 minutes there may be a problem and veterinary assistance should be obtained. It is important that the foal is positioned with its two front feet first followed by the nose. If this is not observed a vet needs to be contacted.

Once the foal is born let the umbilical cord break on its own accord and let the mare rest until she is ready to get up.

Stage 1

This stage is of variable length and can start up to 4-5 before the hours birth. The uterus starts to contract and position the foal in preparation for birth. The mare becomes uncomfortable and restless and may start to sweat. She will walk around with her tail raised, may



Stage 3

The placenta should be expelled within 3 hours. If it does not veterinary assistance will be needed as the mare may have a retained membrane, which can be quite harmful for your mare. You should examine the placenta by spreading it out to ensure it is intact. Note: remembering that there will

be a hole from the opening of the sack to allow the foal out.

The Foal

The foal should normally stand within one hour and start suckling the mare within 2 hours. If it takes more than 2 hours to stand or longer than 3-4 hours to suckle contact your vet immediately.



Tasmania - Return of the Shires

Geoffrey Blainey, in his book 'Black Kettle and Full Moon Daily Life in a Vanished Australia' (2003) states: "It is a sign of the strong but now forgotten regionalism that different breeds of draught horses were favoured in different areas. For years the Suffolk Punch was the favourite in the Hunter Valley, the Shire Horse in Tasmania and the heavy Schleswig horse on South Australian farms."


Tasmania is a small State, closely settled and had a cool climate, just like England. There were also a large number of English settlers

there, as against the mix of Scottish and Irish elsewhere. This no doubt accounts for the popularity of the Shire in that State. It was by far the biggest Shire breeding State in proportion to it's size.

Society member, Tim Peel, has spoken to some of the old Clydesdale Victorian breeders over the last 30 vears. whose fathers bred Shires. "Thev remembered their fathers going to Tasmania to purchase Shire stallions," Tim recalls. He added that although Shires were very popular around the 1890's and early 1900's. thev had mostly died out in the 1920's. However some studs kept the

pure bred Shires going until the 1960's or so. Tim believes that there would be descendants of these horses in Tasmania today.

With such an interesting and rich history with Shire Horses, it is exciting to see some registered Shires being imported into Tasmania in the last 18 months. Max Marriott judged two Shires, Longcopy Charlotte and Ingleside Dancer, at Deloraine Agricultural Show in Tasmania recently and from now on the numbers can only grow.
