



# www.shirehorsesociety.com.au Unveiling of the registration certificate for the Australian Shire Horse Stud Book

We are pleased to announce that we have finalised the innovative registration certificate for the Australian Shire Horse Stud Book, which is to be open for registrations on 1 August, 2008 for the upcoming breeding season.

SHSA President, Helene Scarf, said, "We wanted a unique design that reflected the heritage of the Shire Horse as well as its place in Australia.

"The committee decided to ask Graham West, accomplished artist, graphic designer and founder of the SHSA in 1978, to take on the job.

"Graham designed the original SHSA logo, as well as updated it for our relaunch in 2004. He was very pleased to be asked to design our registration certificate almost 30 years after he first started the Society."

The design features key elements of Australia - kangaroos, golden beaches, the ocean and the sunny blue sky.

"We were thrilled with Graham's concept for the certificate. We feel that it represents what the SHSA is all about, promoting this historical breed in a modern society.

"The design has colour and movement and also incorporates the Shire's English heritage with Henry VIII riding the Great Horse – ancestor of the modern Shire," Helene said.

The Stud Book will be administrated using a computer program created by Craig Huigenza in the USA.

Deb Buckland, SHSA member and newly appointed Registrar for the Australian Shire Horse Stud Book, said "Craig's software is now used by most heavy horse breeds in North America, including the American and Canadian Shire Horse Associations. It is easy to use and has great functionality.

"We want to thank both Graham West and Craig Huizenga for all the work they put into getting the certificate and the program just right. We are sure it will be popular with our members as we open it for registrations this year.

"The first horse issued with a certificate was Cedars Majestic, son of Ladbrook Edward (Imp UK). Ladbrook Edward was the foundation sire for the reintroduced Shire breed in Australia in the early 1980's." Deb said.



# **President's Report**

We had a very successful SHSA seminar in January. With 45 attendees everyone I spoke to said they loved it, learned a lot and met heaps of new people who they could network with in the future and would all come back again next year. Thank you all for coming and also the 34 people who stayed back on Sunday morning and attended our AGM.

On behalf of the SHSA I'd like to thank the following speakers: Rob Pashen for his talk on Applied Reproductive Technologies and embryo transfers; Max Marriott for teaching us how to select a Shire; Tim Peel and Col Brown for talking to us about showing horses to their best advantage and ringcraft and Kristen Marriott for teaching us about the horses anatomy. Kristen drew with a white marker the skeleton of a horse onto Dutchess and gave us an anatomy lesson.

Mark Peel, Master Farrier and heavy horse expert displayed at least 40 different kinds of horse shoes, explaining their purposes and taught us more about shoeing Shires. Byron Biffin spoke about treating the horses who had Equine Influenza at the university where he works and told us what symptoms to watch out for.

Next year's seminar will be held on the 10th and 11th January and the main topic by popular request will be focused on harness. Luckily, I bumped into Terry Goodear at the President's Luncheon at the Sydney Royal Easter Show this year (at the invitation of Rob Vickery, RAS President and Patron of our Society) and ear tagged Terry to be the key speaker at the seminar. He

is one of Australia's greatest heavy horse harness drivers. Terry has worked, showed and managed the Carlton Clydesdale Team and drove them all over Australia for many years.

Another good news item is the launching of the Australian Shire Horse Stud Book Registration Certificate. Special thanks go to Helen Kuiper for working tirelessly with the American program designer Craig, trying to fit in all of the material. Also Ineke Kuiper formulating the Rules Registration and liaising with the RAS and other breed societies, closing loopholes to make sure that all of the (UK) breed standards are vehemently upheld. It's of utmost importance to adhere precisely the breed to standards to preserve the breed.

Lastly, a big thank you to Grahame West who designed the registration certificate. Little did Grahame know that when he registered Shire Horse Society of Australia back in 1978, that 30 years later we would be getting the Australian Shire Horse Stud Book up and Running. Grahame has done a marvellous job of incorporating our English Shire horse into the Australian landscape in his wonderful design.

A combination of all this hard work is laying the foundation to further the Shire breed in Australia and it's a real privilege being part of an organisation that is so enthusiastic and committed to our marvellous horses.



# <u>Shire Horses 'face extinction in 10 years'</u>

Extract: The Daily Telegraph UK

"It has been a symbol of Britishness for centuries, serving man in war and work, but experts have warned that the British shire horse is facing extinction within 10 years. Numbers have dwindled to just 3500 from 6000 just 10 years ago, and unless a proper breeding programme is introduced the breed could die out. Up to 300 female shires of breeding age are usually needed yearly to replace those too old to breed, but the UK is breeding only 200. Ken Young from the Shire Horse Society said, "The extinction of the British shire horses is a distinct possibility - we have to do something now rather than wait until it is too late, which could be within ten years.

Shire Horses were brought to Britain in 1066 by William the Conqueror and were used in medieval warfare as living armoured tanks until new weapons made them obsolete. During the industrial revolution they were relied upon to transport goods to the railways. Since then they have been used in farm work, pulling carts and for deliveries and rubbish collection.

Mr Young added, "Another breed of horse, the Suffolk Punch, suffers from the same problem. It is all but extinct and if we don't do something about the Shire horse, that is where we are going. People are even discussing the possibility of a frozen sperm bank for Shire Horse to try to keep the breed going."

The Shire Horse Society claimed French shire horses are starting to overtake the British variety thanks to French government-funded breeding programmes."

Ed: The mission of the SHSA Studbook is to represent the interests of Australian breeders and encourage further breeding and registrations of the expanding Shire Horse breed in Australia.

The National Show in the UK has just had the most entries since World War II. Perhaps the SHS initiative of financial support to exhibit a horse at the Show has encouraged exhibitors.

### The downside of owning Shires

The help with ideas and shared experiences is so encouraging when you are totally involved in, and overwhelmed with, trying to save a horse's life 24/7.

Kristin Marriott deserves a special mention because I know that she made herself available to talk to owners of horses with EI, and otherwise sick horses, even though she was not in a flu infected area herself. On behalf of the SHSA, thank you Kristin.


# Registrations

# <u>The Great Clydesdale Migration</u> - a great double DVD

A review by Helen Kuiper Have you ever wondered what it would be like to ride a great Shire or a Clydesdale over the moors of Scotland and England? To stop overnight in picturesque village pubs, with your horses grazing peacefully in nearby paddocks?

Most of us can only dream of doing such a trip but you can come delightfully close to it by watching the 2 DVD's called 'The Great Clydesdale Migration.'

This film was made on the trip made by heavy horse lovers in 2006, riding a Shire and a number of Clydesdales, from their Isle of Skye in the north of Scotland to their new home in the Lakes District, England. The distance covered was 772 kms and the trip took over 5 weeks.

During the trip they climbed to the top of mountains, enjoying magnificent scenery, and descended into beautiful green valleys. They followied ancient tracks and paths which the heavy horses managed surprisingly well. The production is professional and I found the music quite moving in parts.
